

Community Driven Environmental Health Project (CDEHP) Pakistan

Context

- 1. Project area is 65% rural and 35% small towns.
- 2. Project works in close collaboration with Local Government and local leadership, and is aligned with Pakistan Approach Towards Total Sanitation (PATS) and Pakistan Behaviour Change Communication (BCC) strategy.
- 3. Conservative culture necessitates separate engagement with and outreach to women and girls in village settings; the project methodology aims to ensure equity in activities.

Highlights of the approach

- 1. Participatory methodology at village level combining Participatory Learning and Action (PLA), BCC, Community/School Led Total Sanitation (CLTS/SLTS).
- 2. Water Safety Plans incorporate sanitation improvements to protect aquifers, watershed protection and safe water projects.
- 3. Village and school Environmental Health action plans.

- 2. Project Oversight Committee has been owned by the Local Government and renamed as Provincial Steering Committee (PSC)
- 3. Community engagement in and empowerment through the project
