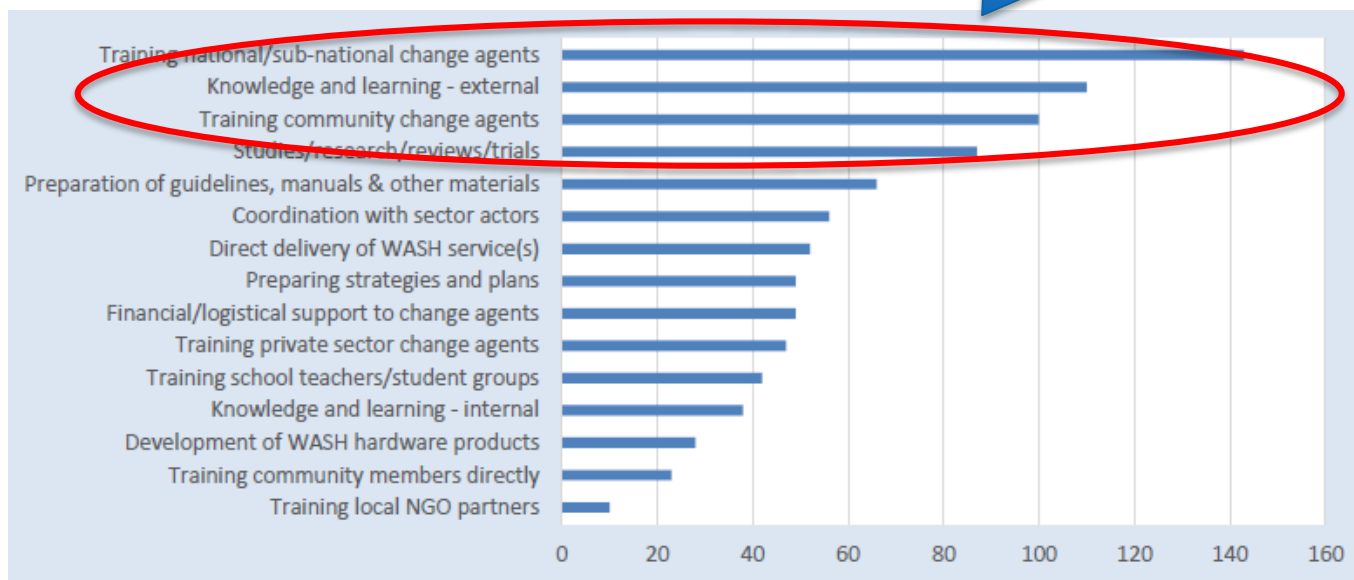

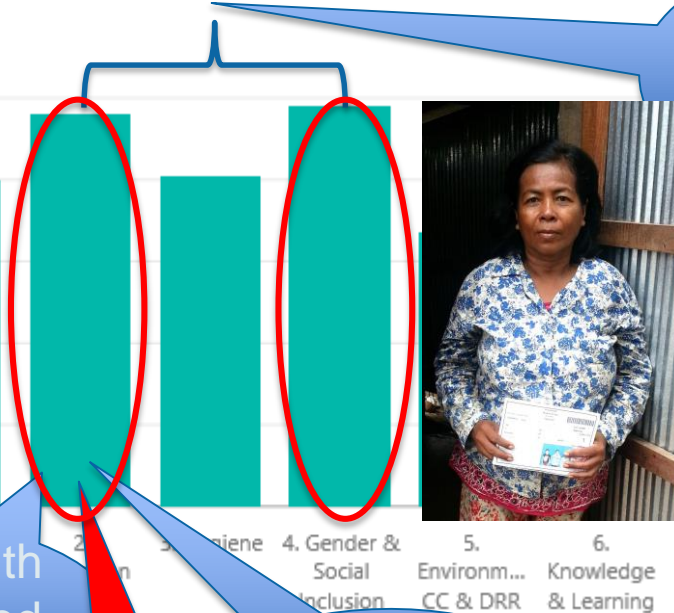

56% of 1,704 targeted WASH Comms have >50% women

Only 7 of 29 projects ensure PWDs are WASH decision-makers

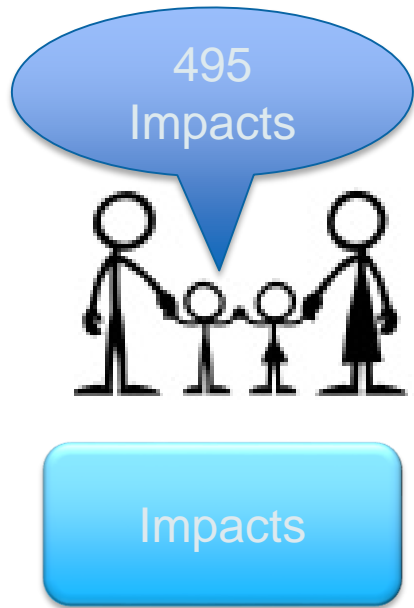
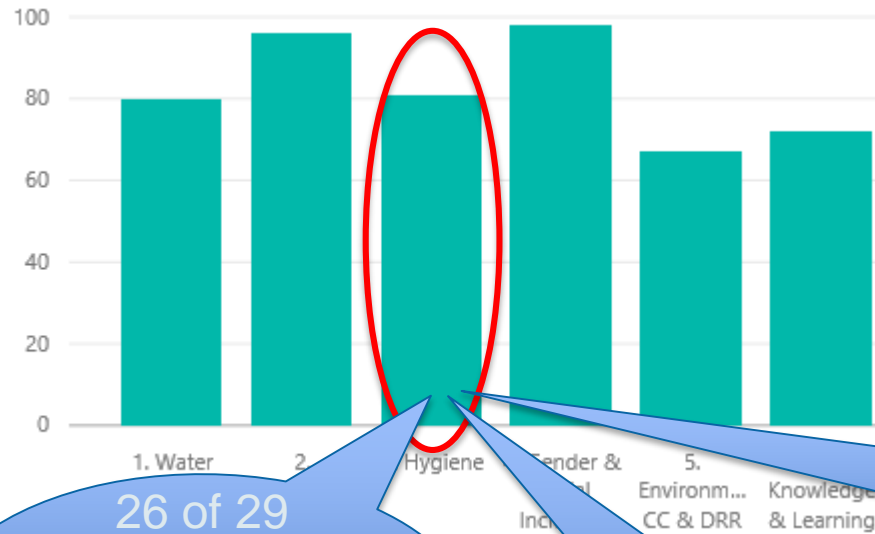

Impacts: hygiene benefits?



26 of 29 projects target schools; 187k students (56% of target)

1.3 mill with increased knowledge (54% of target)

736k HWWS (39% of target)

School handwashing facilities for 56k students (29% of target)
