

Disability and WASH:

The role of Local Government and CSOs in making WASH accessible for people with disability.

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General understanding of disability and WASH issues

- O 'Disability' = physical disability.
- Physical disability = issues affecting wheelchair users.
- Improving WASH access = installing ramps at toilets.
- Most policy makers and implementers see that their realm of influence is only to improve WASH facilities in public spaces and to create awareness of rights.



What could local government do?

- Meetings where disabled people are invited to share their stories
- Encourage the development of local networks for people with disability and consult these groups during decision making.
- Including indicators in their development plans
- Ensuring NGOs and CSOs working in their area make their programs inclusive
- New infrastructure should be built with inclusivity in mind
- Program delivery (ie Sanitation Marketing and CLTS) can be adapted to be made more inclusive.



What can implementers do?

- Genuinely consult people with disability
- Lead by example
- Think beyond public WASH
- Focus more on ensuring people with disabilities have equal access to information and can participation in WASH programs.
- Monitor with more than numbers
- Collaborate between NGOs to avoid replication
- Engage with DPOs
- Work with all levels of government and engage traditional leaders.
- You can't solve everything but know who else can.



What can we all do?

- Actively ask disabled people about WASH needs
- Listen to people with disabilities as well as masons and engineers
- Avoid vague terms and jargon when describing what you are doing to make your work more inclusive
- Rather than looking for a standard answer or outcome, look for a standard process.
